Our chapter is thrilled to have initiated the Dean of the College of Engineering, Dr. Cammy Abernathy, this year!

**Member involvement dramatically increased** from recent years, likely as a result of dedicating a portion of the Tau Beta Pi Scholarship for Florida Alpha to a scholarship for active members. Chapter **members and electees contributed over 2,800 hours towards our projects**, an increase of 30 hours from 2014-2015! In addition, **a total of 84 new members were initiated!** 

The success of our chapter is the direct result of the **28 members that served in officer positions**. These officers helped organize **100 chapter projects**, including many great community service projects such as volunteering at Relay For Life, helping remodel an elementary school, and regularly cleaning up a local road through the Adopt-a-Street Program.

We were also able to increase the number of projects from last year while also maintaining the same quality in all of our endeavors.

Florida Alpha is honored that our successful year has been recognized by the Benton Engineering Council as the **Most Outstanding Medium Society**. With over 50 engineering student organizations on campus, we are excited to have been recognized!

Our chapter is immensely grateful for the dedication of our officers, advisors and members. All of these individuals were vital towards helping our chapter achieve its goals. It is clear that Florida Alpha has much to look forward to in the upcoming years!





Lastly, one electee arrived at the very last moment before the ceremony began, which caused some concerns as nobody was able to contact the person prior to this. Once that electee arrived, the ceremony itself proceeded flawlessly.

All roles were performed to a high standard thanks to both experienced officers and one advisor participating, all which were willing to rehearse prior to the formal ceremony. 



Furthermore, we raised close to \$150 by giving out coffee and snacks in exchange for charitable contributions out of the TBP office during office hours.

To prepare for Relay, officers gathered to work on signs for our fundraising booth and crafts for one of our fundraisers. The service coordinator gathered supplies such as tent, chairs, whipped cream, and pie tins before the event.





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(2) Nomination Summary: Why should Kiersten Wang receive the Tau Beta Pi Laureate Award?

- **Reason 1:** During five years as a civil engineering student, Kiersten has maintained a high academic standard achieving a 3.82 GPA and membership into Tau Beta Pi. She is also a member of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars.
- **Reason 2:** While at UF, Kiersten competed for the Gator Gymnastics team, set career high scores in vault, floor, beam, and uneven bars to help earn three NCAA Team National Championships.
- **Reason 3:** Kiersten used her role as a member of the Gator Gymnastics team to engage with children with cancer and disabilities in outreach programs such as Stomp the Swamp and Climb for Cancer.
- **Reason 4:** As the GatorTRAX Coordinator, Kiersten has set up and run five successful GatorTRAX sessions with one more planned before the end of the academic year that have helped over 100 young students, candidates, and members get excited about engineering.
- **Reason 5:** Kiersten has been one of the most dedicated and dependable officers at Florida Alpha. She actively participates in the chapter discussions at the officer meetings and has remained involved in all aspects of the chapter!

### (3) Biographical Sketch

Kiersten Wang is a 5<sup>th</sup> year Civil Engineering student at the University of Florida. While at UF she competed for the Gator Gymnastics team, helping to earn three NCAA Team National Championships. Ms. Wang also leads the Tau Beta Pi "Gator Trax" program which organizes and runs unique engineering activities for aspiring young students in the Gainesville area.

Before attending the University of Florida, Ms. Wang was an outstanding student at Palmer Ridge High School in Monument, Colorado, attaining a 3.98 unweighted GPA. Ms. Wang balanced her time in high school between her class-leading academics and her unrelenting training regimen as a competitive gymnast. Ms. Wang was a 4-time Junior Olympic National Qualifier, and a 2-time Nastia Liukin Supergirl Cup Qualifier. She was voted the 2011 Outstanding Sportswoman of the Year by Colorado USA Gymnastics Organization. In 2010, Ms. Wang was the Colorado Individual State Champion, a feat she repeated in 2011. She led her team to the overall team title, demonstrating her commitment to personal excellence, as well as the excellence of her team.

Ms. Wang was introduced to the field of engineering by her father, Todd Wang, who served 20 years in the Army Corps of Engineers and is also a member of Tau Beta Pi. Kiersten Wang is a vital member of the University of Florida and the Florida Alpha Chapter of Tau Beta Pi.

### (4) Contributions to the Fostering of Liberal Culture

During Kiersten Wang's time at the University of Florida she has participated in many different activities and contributed greatly to the fostering of a liberal culture. Ms. Wang was a member of the University of Florida 3-time National Champions gymnastics team and used this platform to help give back to the community.

Every year, the Florida Gymnastics team puts on the Link to Pink meet where they raise awareness for breast cancer and honor victims of breast cancer as well as breast cancer survivors. As a part of the meet, the women on the team participate in events throughout the week to promote the meet, help patients and raise awareness. The members of the team spend a day at Hope Lodge, serving dinner, eating dinner and getting to know recovering cancer patients. The team also goes to the graffiti wall (A 400m long wall where graffiti is allowed and encouraged) on 34<sup>th</sup> Street in Gainesville and paints the entire wall pink. The team also participates in the breast cancer walk that runs by the wall they painted. The team also has a food drive in November to collect canned food to give underprivileged people a Thanksgiving dinner.

As part of the Florida Gymnastics team, Ms. Wang also participated in Stomp the Swamp, an event for autistic children to flex their muscles and climb obstacle courses, Climb for Cancer, a similar event for children with cancer that gives them an opportunity to play various sports with the Gator athletes they admire, and was a Gymnastics camp counselor in 2014, providing many young gymnasts with an excellent role model on and off the mats.

In addition to working with her team on volunteer projects, Ms. Wang takes the initiative to participate in community service work on her own. Working through the University Athletic Association's volunteer and community service organization, Goodwill Gators, Ms. Wang regularly attended Caleb's Pitch, an organization that visits children in the hospital and does splatter paint projects with them to bring some happiness and joy to their days. Ms. Wang also worked through Goodwill Gators to participate in Miracle on Main Street, an event that gives underprivileged kids a Christmas and an opportunity to receive gifts from Santa.

As a member of Tau Beta Pi, Ms. Wang is the coordinator of the GatorTRAX children's outreach program. GatorTRAX is an engineering outreach program hosted by student volunteers from Tau Beta Pi and other engineering honor societies, who teach a topic of engineering to K-12 students. The students are then led through a hands-on activity pertaining to the engineering material presented in that particular GatorTRAX session. Ms. Wang has taken on the challenge of the continued expansion this Tau Beta Pi program by advertising it to schools with flyers and with successful events throughout the 2015-2016 school year. Not only has Ms. Wang planned the events throughout the school year by contacting other honor societies to host a particular GatorTRAX event, she has also planned out lessons, taught the material, and walked through the hands-on activities with the children and volunteers. Ms. Wang has led an event on groundwater pollution in which the children learned about the water treatment procedures and built their own water bottle filter. On another occasion, Ms. Wang also put together an activity on the construction of stable structures; accordingly, the children

built steady spaghetti and marshmallow towers. Ms. Wang was inspired to take on this officer position with the goal of encouraging young students to pursue engineering or other technical careers without being fearful that a technical career would be too arduous.

Ms. Wang isn't just an all-star in community service, she is also an all-star on the gymnastics floor and in the classroom. Ms. Wang achieved career highs of 9.9/10 on Vault, 9.75/10 on Bars, 9.775/10 on Beam and 9.925/10 on Floor Exercise, demonstrating her outstanding athletic ability. Aside from being 3-time National Champions, the Gator Gymnastics team won the Southeastern Conference Championship in 2012 and 2013. In the 2012 National Championship, Ms. Wang vaulted her way to a 9.85/10 helping the Gators to a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish, just a tenth off of the National Title. In the 2013 SEC Championships, Ms. Wang scored a 9.9/10 on the Floor Exercise, scoring for the Gators and helping them win the conference title. During the 2015 Gymnastics season, Ms. Wang competed as part of every floor and vault line up throughout the season posting career highs on both Vault and Floor. At the 2015 National Championship, Ms. Wang again contributed to the overall team score to win the National Title with a 9.9/10 on the Floor Exercise and a 9.825/10 on Vault.

Ms. Wang was named to the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015. She was also named to the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches Scholastic All-American team in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015, showing unrivaled success in the classroom amongst her fellow student-athletes. It almost goes without saying that Ms. Wang has made the Dean's List at the University of Florida numerous times, in Spring 2012, Fall 2013, Fall 2014, Spring 2015, and Fall 2015.

To use a gymnastics term, Kiersten Wang has consistently "shown off" her commitment to and excellence in athletics, academics and altruism. Ms. Wang has provided a shining contribution to the fostering of the liberal culture at the University of Florida and is a stand-out member of Tau Beta Pi.

### (5) Participation in Tau Beta Pi Activities

During the electee process, Kiersten attended all of the required events as well as additional service and social events despite her busy gymnastics schedule. The following is her event participation during the fall 2014 semester in chronological order. Note that in FL-A chapter, candidates are not required to attend General Body Meeting #3 since that is when candidate elections are held. In addition, candidates are permitted one drop meeting which Kiersten did not use. Kiersten was initiated into Tau Beta Pi on December 21, 2014.

As a member, Kiersten has stayed equally involved by continuing to pursue other opportunities in the chapter. In addition to attending meetings and social events, she volunteered for the officer position of GatorTRAX coordinator in Fall 2015. In her position as GatorTRAX coordinator, she has taken it upon herself to continue the success of the GatorTRAX program. Not only has she obtained hosts for these events, she has also taken it upon herself to lead two GatorTRAX events on her own. For one activity, she lead a presentation and activity about ground water and water treatment to a group of young students. In this activity, the students used what they learned about water treatment to create their own personal water filtration system. In another event, she lead an activity about tower structures, where the students built spaghetti marshmallow towers. The goal for these towers were to be as tall as possible while remaining stable and could withstand "high winds". 


